


THIS HOUSE STOOD ON THE EAST SIDE OF MIDDLE STREET (NOW HOWARD AVENUE), NEAR EAST KING STREET. It was erected as a barracks for General Forbes's troops, on their return from Fort Pitt. British prisoners were confined in it during the Revolutionary War. Taken down in 1886, when Shippen Street was opened.

Published by the Author, Lancaster, PA, 1927 There are many examples of early homeownership by families and individuals of African descent throughout the Mussertown and Adamstown neighborhoods of the historic City of Lancaster. These families were able to acquire their homes in the 18th century due to employment opportunities in extraction industries, manufacturing and various services that provided sufficient income, according to tax and census records. Some are described in this report.

The Burg-Moton dwelling is notable because of its association with Christian Burg, See Site No. 9—African American Domestic Spaces-Page 5. And Charles Moton, a Civil War veteran. This home continues today as a residence and is one of the few existing homes in the southeast area that has been restored its original appearance as a mid-18th century story and a half log home. This was a common style of home throughout this area of the City which was settled during this early period. Many homes of this original construction and style still exist behind modern exterior siding materials.



### Mussertown & Adamstown

Southeast Area of Borough of Lancaster, 1744 "Sale of 15 acres from Hans Musser to Adam Simon Kuhn establishes "housing development" known as Adamstown."

Who made the first move we do not know, but on September 7, 1744, John and Veronica "Frony" Musser, for the sum of 190 pounds, sold to Dr. Adam Simon Kuhn, of the Borough of Lancaster, 15 acres of their land. The piece of ground they sold was bounded on the northeast by the Provincial Road (King Street); on the northwest by land of James Hamilton (along present Church Street); on the southwest by land of John Musser (along present Rockland Street), and on the southeast by land also of John Musser (along present Locust Street).<sup>19</sup>



# **African American Domestic Spaces**

Itinerary for a Walking Tour - Excerpts from Negro Entry Book, 1820



A t the time of the 1820 ordinance requiring free people of color to "appear before the Mayor and enter their Names," African Americans lived in all four quadrants of the borough. Included in the ranks of free black property owners were James Clendenin and Benjamin Galloway (of Middle Street); Dinah McIntire of Strawberry and Vine; Joseph Aarons of Spring Garden (probably present-day Lemon Street); and the family of Issac and Charlotte Gilmore on Water Street.

According to the Negro Entry Book, a number of African Americans lived in houses on Middle Street (present day Howard Avenue). Further research may reveal that some of those houses are still standing today. In any event, the combination of extant buildings that are comparable to the ones lived in by African Americans (identified in the 1798 and 1815 Federal Direct tax Lists and other property records) and household lists (drawn from the Negro Entry Book) make it possible to reconstruct African American residence patterns.

#### 1. William Montgomery House, 19-21 S. Queen Street

- <u>NEB 96</u>: Dinah Gillepsy, negress, aged about twenty-eight years, resides with William Montgomery.Esq., by occupation a house servant, has no family [June 9, 1820]
- NEB 104:Thomas Johnson, mulatto, aged about twenty nine years, resides<br/>with William Montgomery, Esq., by occupation a house servant,<br/>has a wife named Maris Johnson who is also hired with Mr.<br/>Montgomery & has no other family [June 30, 1820]



#### 2. Pennsylvania Arms [Slaymaker Tavern], E. King Street

"Since Samuel Slaymaker owned a public house in the first block of East King, it seems likely that this tavern or public house provided temporary shelter for Bethel's small congregation [from 1817-1821]." (Leroy Hopkins)

Henry Slaymaker held the license for the tavern and Samuel Slaymaker was the landlord in 1815, and again in 1825. (Ellis & Evans)

<u>NEB: 22, 25, 26, 42, 43, 61, 93, 189, 214</u>, and <u>219</u> include mention of living with Samuel Slaymaker (25 & 26 in Orange Street); occupations reported include house servant, cook, kitchen servant, and waiter.

#### 3. Peter Biers House, 111 Church Street

<u>NEB 83</u>: *Ellen Curry*, widow, mulatto, widow aged about forty years, resides in Peter Biers' house in Adamstown, by occupation a washerwoman, has a child of David Lewis and another child boarding also (illegible) Pampatines & no other family [June 5, 1820]

- <u>NEB 45</u>: Letitia Portland, negress, aged about 24 years, wife of Peter Portland now in Chambersburg, resides with her mother in Mrs. Stockslager's in Adamstown, washerwoman &, has three children residing with her, viz. Ann, Joseph, and Abba, has no other family [June 2, 1820]
- <u>NEB 46</u>: David Henderson also Anderson, negro, aged about twenty eight years, lives in Mrs. Stockslager's house in Adamstown, by occupation a Distiller, has a wife named *Elizabeth* & one child named *Rebecca* [June 2, 1820]
- <u>NEB 106</u>: Charles Carter, negro, aged about 21 years, lives with his mother Nancy Carter, by occupation a laborer, has no other family [August 16, 1820]

#### 6. Benjamin Galloway--Middle [Howard] and Diamond [Duke]

- NEB 67:Benjamin Galloway, mulatto, enters that he is forty nine years,<br/>resides in his own house in Mussertown, has a wife named Han-<br/>nah and two children viz. - <u>NEB 192</u>: Betsy Pierce, a mulatto woman, a spinster, about 25 years of age, spinster lives at *Benjamin Galloway*, served her time with Judge Hamilton of Carlisle, came to Lancaster last October, married to *George Pierce*, who has left her [April 6, 1825]
- <u>NEB 194</u>: Joseph Buckram, negro, aged about 25 years, residing at Benjamin Gallaway, by profession a labourer

#### 7. James Clendenin 500 Block Middle Street [Howard Avenue]

#### 8. Christian Burg 515 Middle Street [Howard Avenue]



The one-story stone, log frame, and half-timber buildings found in this part of Mussertown, especially along Church Street and Howard Avenue, represent common house forms inhabited by laborers and artisans through the Borough of Lancaster.





#### MUSSERTOWN

Edward Shippen to Hamilton. 9 March 1769. (Letters of Edward Shippen of Lancaster, America Philosophical Society)

#### "Dear Sir,

I have received your favour by Dr. Cox and agreeable to your request to myself as well as I can of the circumstances of Musserstown, all the deeds and papers relating to it being in Philadelphia. I find that the tenants have built 37 pretty good log houses of one story, with brick chimneys, of 16 or more foot square but (not?) all its lots are under good common pale fences."



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There is no established list of the people in this photograph, taken at Shreiner-Concord Cemetery in the City of Lancaster, circa 1918. The occasion was the commemoration of the anniversary of the birth of Abolitionist Congressman, Thaddeus Stevens (1792-1868). Community oral tradition maintains that Charles Moton may be one of the people present for this photograph. Mr. A. L Polite of 540 North Street, Lancaster is centrally featured in the photograph, holding a wreath for the League's effort to honor the Radical Republican Congressman. Can you recognize him or any others?

#### REV. SMITH'S LAST SERMON.

To Leave for Conference at Carlisle on Tuesday—The Congregation Anxious for His Return.

The annual election for members of the board of trustees of the Strawberry Street A. M. E. church was held on Wednesday evening, the following having been elected : Messrs. J. H. H. Butler, George Lord, Charles Moton, Charles Butcher, Edward Humphries, Samuel Morris, David Robinson. The board then elected Mr. Humphries secretary and Mr. David Robinson treasurer. The annual report was read, which showed that \$663.29 had been raised by the church for current expenses, etc.

A vote of thanks was tendered Rev. Seth D. W. Smith, the pastor, for the satisfactory manner in which he has presided over the Board, he being president by reason of his office as pastor. He has been indefatigable in his efforts in working for the spiritual and temporal interest of the church and people. Rev. Smith will preach his last sermon on Sunday next, when he will attend the annual conference. The people earnestly desire his return, and the good work he has performed while here will doubtless assure his being sent back Rev. Smith responded by Conference. feelingly to the vote of thanks. Two years ago the pastor of this church organized the Ladies' Auxiliary Mite Missionary Society, with Mrs. Smith as president. The society has been doing good work. On Monday evening next they will give their annual treat to the members. The address will be delivered by the pastor.

On Tuesday Rev. Smith will join Rev. Buckley, of Columbia, and a number of other ministers from Delaware and Philadelphia, and leave for Conference, which convenes on Wednesday, May 14, at Carlisle, this State, in seventy-fourth annual session. Right Rev. Henry M. Turner, D. D., LL. D., will preside and will be assisted by associate bishops. This Conference is the oldest in the conbeen organized in nection, having 1816 by Right Rev. Richard Allen, with a membership of three. It now numbers 1,000 members, with 86 itinerant and 30 local ministers, with a membership of over 12,000. There are connected with the Conference a publishing house at Philadelphia; the Sunday-school Union Publishing House in Nashville, Tennessee, from which are sent out every three months over 600,000 teachers' and scholars' quarterlies for Sabbath-schools; an eight-page weekly church paper, and several other publications, showing that the colored folks are awake and hard at work.
